# NYC Partnership Grant Call to create more opportunities for our youth through the National Youth Fund

#### Overview

The National Youth Council (NYC) seeks to provide opportunities for youth to share their views, hear diverse perspectives, as well as take action on issues that matter to them. We also aim to imbue youths with values and skills to thrive in a globalised world while keeping a strong Singaporean heartbeat. We are looking for partners to better meet youth needs, co-curate and offer more opportunities for youths to be empowered and be the change in taking action.

## **Call for Proposals**

The thematic partnership grant call application periods for 2022 for the **National Youth Fund (NYF) Youth Programmes/Capability Development (YPCD)** grant are as follows:

### **Applications**

Applications will not be accepted outside of the partnership grant call period. Applications will be evaluated on a <u>first-come</u>, <u>first-served</u> basis and may be subject to availability of funds. NYC reserves the right to reject applications which are not aligned with grant requirements.

Successful applicants will receive funding of <u>up to</u> 80% of total allowable project cost, capped at \$100,000 per project that falls within a priority theme. Funding for projects that fall outside the grant call priority themes will be capped at a maximum of \$50,000 per project.

Projects that demonstrate exceeding merits in terms of project <u>scale</u> and <u>impact</u> and are sustained over a duration of at least 1 to 3 years may be considered for higher funding beyond \$100,000 per project. These applicants will be required to pitch their project to an external panel for their evaluation.

# Criteria

<b>ELIGIBILITY CRITE</b>	RIA	
1. Who Can Apply?	Youth Sector Organisations (not-for-profit organisations or not-for-profit young start-ups, social service organisations, Institutes of Higher Learning (IHL), and social enterprises (SE), whose business or key initiatives are primarily focused on engaging and developing youths).	
2. What Can Be Funded?	<ul> <li>Projects must be targeted at youths (aged between 15 to 35 years old) and must involve Singaporeans/ Singapore Permanent Residents.</li> <li>Key Considerations for Funding:</li> <li>Project meets a critical gap or emerging need in the youth sector.</li> <li>Project possesses unique value proposition and creates impact to the youth/youth sector.</li> <li>Project has sufficient risk mitigation strategies and impact evaluation.</li> <li>Project involves wide audience and/or community outreach and has significant media impact.</li> <li>Project is scalable for the next year or so.</li> <li>Project adopts a clear business model to ensure long-term sustainability</li> </ul>	
3. What are additional guidelines under the Youth Civic Discourse theme?	<ul> <li>Projects involving conversations should adhere to the following guiding principles:         <ul> <li>Safe space for honest sharing of perspectives</li> <li>Conversations can be part of series to facilitate relationship building over-time</li> <li>Inclusive environment where participants from different backgrounds can meaningfully interact</li> <li>Participants are provided with topical content guides/ context briefs for conversations to take place</li> <li>Participants are provided with a balanced range of perspectives during the conversations (MCCY/NYC car provide some policy information/content to help set the context for certain topics).</li> <li>Conversations need not land on consensus or agreement, but focus on process of building civic capacity outcomes through the conversations</li> <li>In addition:</li></ul></li></ul>	

- Applicants should propose how they intend to curate content/ context setting materials that would help facilitate conversations among participants.
- Applicants should provide a summary of discussion pointers after conversations have taken place.
   These may be anonymised to protect the privacy of the participants.
- In general:
  - o Projects should not undermine the Government agencies/ public institutions
  - Projects should not have content held as objectionable by the general public, or that may adversely affect social cohesion in Singapore
  - o Projects should be secular in nature, not to promote any faith or political beliefs
  - Projects should not be utilised as platforms to solicit feedback on and/ or suggest changes to Government policies
  - Projects should build in programme evaluation to measure whether participants have benefited from the civic discourse opportunities or toolkits/resources. << MCCY/NYC will provide more details on civic capacity outcomes and measures that applicants can take reference from>>

As the estimated processing time per project is 2 to 3 months, applicants are advised to submit their application at least 2 months before the start of their project. **Projects which require significant grant (more than \$50,000) would require a longer processing time of 3 to 6 months.** These applicants are advised to submit their application at least 3 months before the start of their project.

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#### FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

#### Q1: Can I submit an application if I missed the grant call period?

A1: No. Applications outside the grant call period are not accepted. Please submit at the next applicable grant call.

#### Q2: Can I submit an application via email?

A2: No. All applications are to be submitted online via OurSG Grants portal (https://oursggrants.gov.sg)

#### Q3: When will I be notified on the status of the application?

A3: All applications have an estimated processing time of at least 2 months, from the point of application. Applicants will be notified thereafter. Projects which require significant grant (more than \$50,000) would require a longer processing time (3 months and above). Please note that the processing time may be delayed if applications are incomplete/ require extensive clarifications.

# Q4: Can I apply for/ receive other sources of funding in addition to the NYF for my project?

A4: Applicants are encouraged to apply for other sources of funding<sup>4</sup> for the same project as the NYF grant is provided on a cost-sharing basis. Applicants are required to declare their funding sources in the application form.

# Q5: My project is requesting for a grant of over \$50,000 and I am required to submit a logic model. Will there be assistance provided to develop a logic model?

A5: All applicants are encouraged to outline your programme's theory of change and the logic model provides clarity on whether the programme is designed to achieve your desired outcomes. A guide to developing a logic model is available for download at <a href="NYC">NYC</a> | National Youth Fund. NYC officers will also be able to support applicants. Additionally, a workshop on understanding and developing logic models may be conducted in 2022 if there is sufficient interest. #### Q6: Do I need to engage an auditor to audit the Statement of Accounts for my project?

A6: For projects with an approved grant quantum of up to \$\$50,000, applicants are required to submit signed and endorsed Statement of Accounts (SOA) and all scanned copies of receipts of the project expenses to NYC. For projects with an approved grant quantum exceeding \$\$50,000, applicants will have to engage an auditor and submit financial statements for the approved project that are externally audited by a Public Accountant. The cost of engaging the auditor can be included in the project budget.
