Government will work with youths on implementation of Youth Panel ideas

Thursday, 17 April 2025 – The Government will work alongside and support youths to implement the recommendations from the inaugural run of the Youth Panels.

At an appreciation event organised by the Ministry of Culture, Community and Youth (MCCY) and the National Youth Council (NYC), the consolidated response from the Government to the policy recommendations by the Youth Panels were shared with panellists. Youth Panel members reflected on their experience and shared their vision for youth civic action in Singapore.

Conclusion of inaugural run of Youth Panels

- Supported by MCCY and NYC, the Youth Panels were introduced under the Forward SG exercise to involve youths in the policymaking process. The Youth Panels provided a platform for youths to work directly with the Government to address top-of-mind issues among youths, including financial resilience, careers and employment, digital well-being, and environment and sustainability. Since November 2023, the four panels #GreenHacks, #JobHacks, #LifeHacks and #TechHacks comprising about 120 youths aged 15 to 35, partnered government agencies to conduct research, deliberate on the issues to prioritise, and engage other stakeholders.
- The Youth Panels shared their preliminary ideas at the Youth Policy Forum on 24 August 2024 with fellow youths. The Youth Panels took in the feedback to refine their recommendations after the Forum and submitted their papers in January 2025. Collectively, they reached out to more than 5,000 youths and stakeholders, and more than 20 government agencies and organisations.
- The Government has considered all recommendations made by the Youth Panels. The Government agrees with the issues raised and the intent of the recommendations, and will work with and support youths to implement initiatives in line with these recommendations.

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Youth Panellists themselves will also be continuing with their work on implementing the recommendations. For recommendations that need to be developed in further detail for implementation, the Government will continue to engage youths on these as part of the SG Youth Plan. Stakeholders such as corporates, social enterprises, and youths are invited to partner the Government to implement these recommendations as ground-up initiatives or continue the conversation.
