












## RESIDENT YOUTH LABOUR FORCE AND HIGHEST QUALIFICATION ATTAINED ('000 & %)











## AGE-GENDER DISTRIBUTION OF STIS INCIDENCE RATES (INCIDENCE RATE PER 100,000 POPULATION3)



### INDIVIDUAL SMARTPHONE<sup>1</sup> AND INTERNET<sup>2</sup> USERS BY AGE (%)


